his appears to be a remarkable year for Buffalo. We elected Byron Brown mayor; hockey is back and the Sabres are having a thrilling season; waterfront development is finally getting traction; Marv Levy returned to the Bills; Studio Arena sent a play to Broadway and appointed a promis-ing new artistic director; Congressman Brian Higgins won his mega-million-dollar fight for us against the New York Power Authority; City Honors High School was ranked fourth in the country among public schools by Newsweek; and, probably most important, a majority of people are beginning to realize that a casino in downtown Buffalo would be about as smart as eating rat poison for dinner.

This is also a remarkable year for the Artvoice Best of Buffalo survey. Between our mailin paper ballots and the spiffy online ballot (designed by our clever IT guru Dave Kleinschmidt), we found ourselves tallying more than 75,000 entries. In fact, the response was so overwhelming that we had to move the issue back a week so that we could continue tabulating all the votes. We've finished the counting and the top nominations are printed here for all to read. While most categories have five nominees, you will notice that some have more. In those categories that have more than five nominees, there were just such an incredible number of votes cast, and the races were so tight, that we felt the nomination list had to be expanded to recognize the strength

I would like to commend the Artvoice staff and interns for making sense of some of the ballots. We always have voters who misunderstand the concept of Best of Buffalo, voters who tell us Green Day or U2 are their favorite band and Angelina Jolie is their favorite actress. Forget those. Understanding what a voter has written on a legitimate entry can be more challenging than one might think, too. For example, someone, perhaps fond of bellybuttons, chose the Navel Park as the Best Tourist Attraction.

Names are often butchered almost beyond recognition. Channel 7 newscaster Keith Radford showed up as Keith Bredford, Keith Radcliff, Keith Rathman, Kieth Radston and "Keith the-guy-with-the-tan on 7." Talking Leaves Books received a great number of votes. However, many of those votes appeared as Falling Leaves, Turning Leaves, Counting Leaves, Reading Leafs and so on. Similarly, Rust Belt Books appeared as Rusted Root Books or Rusty Belt Leaves.


Perhaps, since I'm talking about book stores, this would be a good time to make it clear that while Barnes & Noble and Borders both received a great number of votes, the Artvoice survey is not intended to highlight national chains. Rather, it is to bring attention to places, people and businesses that are unique to Buffalo. While Barnes & Noble is an excellent store, and Starbucks has decent coffee, and many people like McDonald's fries, these chain stores offer the exact same product whether you're in Albuquerque, Seattle or Rochester. Apparently some people missed the notice printed on the ballot in all caps: "NO CHAIN STORES_VOTE LOCAL.

Please take note that the finalists are listed in reverse alphabetical order, not in the order they finished in the balloting. Winners will be announced at the Artvoice Best of Buffalo Party this Monday, May 8, 6-9pm at the Town Ballroom. Admission is free, so is the food, and music will be provided by Babik and the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus. Come one, come all.





ur readers tell us that among the region's Most Under-reported Stories is the danger posed to the city by the Seneca Buffalo Creek Casino. We think so, too-though we note that, to its credit, the Buffalo News is devoting more energy to exploring the issue in recent weeks.

Our readers tell us that the danger posed by a downtown casino is also among the Most Overreported Stories. Ah, well-we plead guilty. And, given the inconclusive feedback, we'll just keep writing about it. Other stories Buffalo is tired of hearing about: the Bass Pro deal, the parking ticket blitz-god, so are we-and the Erie County budget crisis.

The voting for Best Local Blog and Best Local Web Site engendered a fruitful conversation about where one draws the line between the two-Buffalo Rising, for example, won a substantial number of votes in both categories. uring the Blizzard of '77, then-mayor
Jimmy Griffin advised Buffalonians to
stay inside and drink a six-pack of Genny. While few agreed with his choice of
beers, everyone agreed that drinking
was a good idea.

Truth be told, we don't need a blizzard to drink.

Buffalo's packed with watering holes of every stripe, and a lot of them are even open 'til 4am. Without looking at our list of nominees, you might think that "Best Bar Food" means greasy burgers, thick reuben sandwiches and chicken wings. But Allen Street Hardware and Mother's, with their cosmopolitan menus, remind us that it simply means good food, served at a bar. Beer Selection is key, and if another huge blizzard hit us today, Byron Brown would probably say, "Get out a shovel and dig your way to Prespa." Though no one quite understands why they have a neon sign advertising dirt-cheap PBR, Prespa won this category in last year's Best of Buffalo, offering customers more than 60 beers from around the world. Pearl Street Grill & Brewery also made the cut this year, based on its own delicious brews, including the popular Trainwreck Lager, Lake Effect IPA, Canal Street Oatmeal Stout and their rotating seasonal list.

Three of our **Best Dive Bar** nominees are conspicuously located in a two-block section of Allen Street—**Mulligan's Brick Bar**, **The Old Pink** and **Nietzsche's**. All we can say is that we think they're raising property values in the neighborhood. When it comes down to it, every bar is simply a gathering place. But only particularly friendly, long-established saloons are deemed **Best Neighborhood Pub**. Among those nominated are



Founding Fathers—who won this category last year—and relative newcomer Allen Street Hardware.

There are plenty of affable bartenders in Buffalo, but **Roxy's Green Room** seems to take the cake, scoring hits in **Best Bartender** with both Jamie and Aimee. Roxy's was also nominated for **Best Lesbian-friendly Bar**, along with its new neighbor just up Main Street, **Miss Kitty's**.

Of course, all those late nights of boozing mean that we love our coffee, too. It's not exactly Seattle, but Buffalo has its fair share of coffeehouses that can brew an excellent cup of joe. Among those nominated are the usuals, **SPoT** and **Caffé Aroma**. In fact, both were voted in for best coffee and best coffeehouse. Hundreds voted for Tim Horton's for best coffee, and Starbucks would've been nominated for both coffee categories, but they're national chains, so their votes were tossed.

Notable is **Café Allegro**, a quaint neighborhood coffee shop on Hertel Avenue, which was nominated for best coffee and who hovered just off the top five list for coffeehouse. Allegro is owned by a local family, displays artwork by local artist and has almost nightly entertainment. Not to mention they have delicious baked goods. **Café 59**, at Franklin and Allen Streets, also was nominated for best coffeehouse, and for good reason. The popularity of its coffee and deli has recently merited an expansion into a neighboring storefront that once housed an antiques shop.



n the history of the Artvoice Best of Buffalo poll—now nearly a decade old—there are certain winners that have held steady throughout. While our readers have been fairly changeable in their top restaurant picks, when asked about the **Best Reason to Live in Buffalo** a top answer has invariably been "the food." Year after year the Food & Drink section has been the one that gets the biggest response out of all the categories. It is also the largest in number, and counting the ballots is no small task. It is particularly daunting due to the sheer amount of different places that are offered as potential "bests." With a few notable exceptions—the bus station for Best Breakfast?—all the candidates are worthy.

In terms of national image, Buffalo is hardly known for "foodiness," a questionable word that smacks of pretension, a quality the majority of Buffalonians seem to detest. The term "foodiness" implies a certain amount of frivolity that neither the people nor the restaurants in this city have embraced—despite one of the **Best New Restaurant** nominees being named **La Tee Da**. (Don't let the name fool you, the food is carefully prepared, ambitious and quite delicious.) Nowhere in Buffalo can you find bacon-and-egg ice cream, or spinach-date fritters fried in beer batter and dusted with confectioner's sugar, both of which were dishes described in last Sunday's *New York Times* food column. What one can find is an abundance of gimmick-free fare served in all manner of styles and settings. Restaurants with an ethnic bent are terrifically popular, perhaps because the city's "melting pot" population lends authenticity to many culinary ventures and dislodges Buffalo's blue-collar, meat-and-potatoes reputation. Still, steakhouses and traditional bar food are just as popular, and diners' loyalties to their choices for **Best Steak** and **Best Burger** have remained pretty consistent through the years.

Illustrating this point, notable nominees this year in Best Steak include **Fiamma** and **Prime 490**, both brand new and both nominated for **Best New Restaurant** as well. The other three nominees in Best Steak are long-standing Buffalo establishments that seem to pop up on the list just about every time. (Much like the previously glorious but now defunct steakhouse Lord Chumley's, R.I.P.)

Not surprisingly, **Best Sushi** got loads of votes for the bygone **Kuni's Sushi Bar.** We kept it as a nominee partly out of respect for Kuni's tremendous 10-year run, but also due to the whispers of a Kuni's take-out joint happening on Lexington—as well as the now confirmed sale of his former business on Elmwood. If this means there will be two good places to get sushi within the city limits, it *might* make up for the suffering undergone by sushi-deprived city-dwellers. (Had enough of the guilt trip yet, Kuni?)

Some categories necessitated an expansion of our five-nominee limit. You may notice that **Best Bakery** is a huge list with eight possible winners. **Best Deli** has nine nominees, and **Best Italian** and **Best Patio** both have seven. While this may seem extreme, having so many nominees in the food categories is bound to benefit those who attend Monday's free **Best of Buffalo Party**, since all the nominees have been asked to donate "tastes" of their specialties.

Now that ought to get people there, considering just how many of you voted for the food as the best thing about our city.





e begin with a hat tip to some our Best Ballot Stuffers, who congregate perenially in this section of the Best of Buffalo polling.

Of course, there's a distinction to be made between ballot-stuffing and mounting a campaign. Plenty of our finalists in this section handed out ballots to customers and urged them to vote. That's fair enough. It is likewise fair to send out emails to all your friends and customers with a link to the Artvoice Web site. We like that people want to win our Best of Buffalo awards; it's flattering. But sometimes the lust for recognition leads to perfidy. The telltales are the same every year: dozens of xeroxed ballots, for example, filled out with the same pen, in the same handwriting, mailed on the same day. Often the ballot stuffers will fill out just enough categories-roughly 25 percent of the ballot must be complete, or we throw it out-to make the ballot count. In this electronic age we can often uncover online ballot stuffers, as well; it's trickier, but our tech guys are aces.

To give an idea of how much ballot-stuffing we're talking about: More than 1,000 ballots were disqualified. The majority of these invalid ballots were chucked because they were obvious frauds.

Rotten Jack's Creep Shack was among the more ambitious of our ballot stuffers this year, having tried to creep into the winner's circle in the Best Gift Shop, Best Men's Clothing, Best Women's Clothing and Best Web Site categories. Perhaps they stretched themselves too thin; they didn't send in enough votes to win in any one of those categories. And once we pulled the fraudulent ballots, they didn't even place.

RedHouse Tattoo also mounted a furious ballot-stuffing campaign. Curiously enough, they need not have bothered: We pulled stacks of clearly bogus ballots for RedHouse out of the mix-a hundred at least-and they still finished as a finalist for Best Tattoo.

Have a little faith in yourselves next year,

RedHouse. Let the people speak. They like you...they really, really like you.

As for the rest of this section, our readers' responses begged the same question as every one of Artvoice's special issues: Who needs to go to the mall? We are a region rich with small, energetic and creative businesses. We make special mention of two that are likely to be displaced by the proposed Elmwood Village Hotel at the corner of Elmwood and Forest. Don Apparel placed in the voting for Best Antique Store and Best Thrift Shop. Mondo Video, owned and operated by Artvoice film editor M. Faust, placed in the voting for Best Video Store. Whatever one's position on the hotel, the city can ill afford to lose businesses like these, which thrive on high pedestrian traffic, proximity to college students and, frankly, cheap rent. Let's hope both shops find new homes that offer all those conditions.



laiming four of the top five spots for **Best Exhibit**, the **Albright-Knox** Art Gallery nearly swept the entire category. Under the leadership of AKAG director Louis Grachos and curators Doug Dreishpoon and Claire Schneider, the gallery has completely reinvented itself in the past two years. The fall 2005 show "Extreme Abstraction" was the first time in the gallery's history that a single exhibit occupied every inch of the building: walls, staircases, floors, hallways, windows, upstairs, downstairs, main building, Clifton Hall and the sculpture garden. More importantly, "Extreme Abstraction" was a powerful confirmation of the Albright-Knox Art Gallery's strength and its most defining character: exemplary abstract and contemporary art

Sailing right alongside the AKAG in Artvoice reader popularity is Squeaky Wheel's outrageously fun exhibit/art party "Love & Sex-the Peepshow," held at the Lennox Hotel. Sex-themed art installations, live music and hundreds of colorfully clad people from Buffalo's various art tribes wandered throughout the hotel sipping, ogling, chatting and bumping politely into tuxedoed gentlemen who had abandoned Mayor Brown's inaugural ball at the Hyatt for something more lively and gritty.

The finalists in the Best Small Gallery are something of which we should certainly be proud, too. Outside of New York City, you'd be hard-pressed to find the level of activity, energy and creativity invested here in Buffalo's small galleries. Honestly, in a side-by-side comparison we make toast out of the galleries in Rochester and Syracuse.

The **Best Dance Company** nominations are a mix running from ballet to belly dancing. Dance is the most physically demanding and disciplined fine art form. And unless you consider the hip-pumping and butt-grinding by Britney Spears art, dance is also the least rewarding in terms of fame or money. Nevertheless, whether it's attending Neglia Ballet performing Don Quixote or dance classes at Folkloric, UB's Zodiaque or Buffalo Contemporary, our readers continue to support dance in Buffalo

In the Best Fine Artist, Best Literary Artist and Best Performance Artist categories the names appearing on ballots seemed endless. Clearly, we have a wholelottaluv for our art people and an enormous community of practicing artists. Eventually a handful of names appeared often enough to rise above the throng, and in a fine proof of Dar-

winian theory, those names truly are some of Buffalo's most talented individuals

Voting on the Best Actor and Actress awards tends to be a silly act of camaraderie among the friends of various actors. various acting companies and loyal audience members. While all of the nominees are, indeed, very good actors—and we do disqualify animated characters and people whose only known acting has been in real-life drama—the roster should, perhaps, be thought of as a list of some of Buffalo's most fondly regarded actors and drinking companions.

The Best Actor nominees: Saul Elkin, founder of Shakespeare in Delaware Park and co-founder of Buffalo's Jew-

ish Repertory Theatre is among Buffalo's most beloved character actors; Jimmy Janowski, current star of BUA's I Am My Own Wife is a genderbending star of remarkable artistry; Chris Kelly, as well-known as an insightful director as an actor, is a performer of impressive versatility; Vincent O'Neill, currently starring in Loot for the Irish Classical Theatre Company, is a founder and mainstay of that company; Brian Riggs, who starred in The Good Thief this season, is equally adept in drama and musical theater; Paul Todaro, who starred in Kavinoky's production of The Cocktail Hour this season, is also a gifted director; and Guy Tomassi impressed with multiple roles this season, including hilarious turns in BUA's Valhalla.

Best Actress nominees: Josephine Hogan, star of this season's Juno and the Paycock with the Irish Classical Theatre, is the perennial Artist in Residence with that company; Kelly Ann Krupski arrived on the scene as Patsy Cline in Kavinoky's popular production of Always...Patsy Cline; Lisa Ludwig is the current star of Urinetown at MusicalFare (and was the Patsy Cline co-star at Kavinoky); Mary Kate O'Connell of O'Connell & Company is the silver-voiced star of her company, where Diva by Diva continues into perpetuity; **Leah Russo** appeared in *Number the Stars* at Theater of Youth this season; and Maggie Zindle starred as Aldonza in Kavinoky's Man of La Man-

As long as Broadway can produce new product, Shea's Buffalo will provide excellent entries in the category of Best Touring Production. This year we got some grade-A shows. Dame Edna, perhaps the most celebrated clown in the English-speaking world, made her Buffalo debut, and Cathy Rigby, the definitive Peter Pan of her generation, made her Buffalo farewell in the role. In addition, this year, Studio Arena pleased audiences, serving as a launching pad for the Broadway-bound Ring of Fire-the Music of Johnny Cash. Broadway didn't love the show the way Buffalo did, but though the show has closed already, it may be back as a touring show some day.

Best Theatre Company nominees: Buffalo United Artists; Irish Classical Theatre; Kavinoky Theatre; MusicalFare; O'Connell & Company; Studio Arena Theatre In this category, we compare apples to oranges, as fans of various theaters cheer for their own. It is nice to know we have so many theater companies worth voting for.
















hether your interest is blues, folk, rock, hip-hop, jazz or whatever, Buffalo has something for you. Buffalo has it all-not Lancaster, not Depew, not East Aurora, not Williamsville, not Cheektowaga. Buffalo.

It's certainly nice to see a few new names on the music scene. Not that we have anything against Buffalo's gifted veteran players or our long-standing music venues, but new blood is necessary and is good for everyone. The Town Ballroom on Main Street opened this year with concert promoters Artie Kwitchoff and Donny Kutzbach and attorney/ guitarist Michael Lee Jackson running the show. The Town Ballroom easily grabbed a nomination for Best Live Music Venue and sidled alongside mainstays like Nietzsche's, Mohawk Place and the Sportsmen's Tavern.

Jesse Zephle, owner of the former Second Skin clothing and sex toy shop, opened Club Diablo on Washington Street last year and is enjoying instant success. Club Diablo received nominations in both the Best New Club and Best Dance Club categories. And speaking of dance clubs, Club Marcella also has a new look, a new location and a spot on the list of nominees in several categories. Another new club nominee is Allen Street Hardware, a successful bar, restaurant and live music venue opened in Allentown by Mark Goldman, the man cited most frequently for starting the resurgence of Chippewa Street. Goldman has also opened an Italian restaurant across from Hardware called Joey's Hard Times Café with Buffalo renaissance man, chef, actor, playwright and horn player Joe Giambra in the kitchen whipping up homemade

A new face on the jazz scene and a Best Jazz

 $\boldsymbol{\mathsf{Band}}$ nominee is the acoustic gypsy-jazz playing of Babik, who hold down Wednesday nights at Allen Street Hardware. The four-man combo, which takes its name from the son of Belgian swing-era guitarist extraordinaire Django Rheinhardt, will be playing at the Artvoice Best of Buffalo Party this Monday, May 8, at the Town Ballroom, 6-9pm Also a jazz nominee and a relatively new band on the scene is Peggy Farrell & the Ladies First Big Band. The Ladies First band may be new, but Peggy Farrell spent years playing with jazz piano legend Al Tinney, who died 2002. As one ballot put it, "Peggy is 75 years old and still cookin'." And she's not the oldest one in the band either. The Ladies First Big Band ranges in age from about 20 to close to 90. One sweet old gal, tenor saxophonist Fran Scharett, toured with the USO during World War II and entertained the troops with big band music when swing was the hot new thing.

The Skiffle Minstrels, led by actor Paul Todaro on bass, are a new breakout act in the Best Folk/ Acoustic Group category. With five of the six players in the band coming out of Buffalo's acting community, and bringing to the stage rarely seen instruments like the accordion, harmonica and fiddle, they make a colorful cast of characters hooting, singing and thrashing their way through a mix of honky-tonk and other classic Americana.

A particularly interesting Artvoice reader nomination for Best Vocalist is the Buffalo Gay Men's Chorus. This chorus of almost 50 singers will also be performing at the Artvoice Best of Buffalo Party on Monday. They will take the stage immediately following some words from Mayor Byron Brown. We are certainly glad that the mayor of Buffalo has decided to come check out the Best of Buffalo. It makes perfect sense—something we're not used to seeing at City Hall.
