



e received more than 2,000 attempts at ballots in or Best of Buffalo poll this year. Of those, more than 1,100 ballots were deemed valid and tallied. The finalists in each category are enumerated on the following pages—listed in no particular order—and the winners will be announced at our annual Best of Buffalo Bash on Monday, April 30 at Town Ballroom.

That party is free and open to everyone who cares to come, with live entertainment and food provided by our many nominees. A good time will be had by all, guaranteed, and the crowd will be studded with city's brightest stars.

Why only 1,100 or so valid ballots? Well, we toss some of them. Ballots that have fewer than 30 categories filled out are deemed invalid. We also toss ballots that we suspect come from ballot stuffers. We can usually tell by tracing IP and email addresses and comparing votes. For snail mail ballots, similar handwriting and numerous entries from the same return address are the obvious tipoffs. Occasionally we get a dozen ballots in one envelope, all filled out in the same handwriting, with the same pick for worst local politician. It's easier to identify fraud than one might think.


However, it should be said that ballot stuffing was far less common this year than in any previous Best of Buffalo survey. Though one member of Buffalo's Common Council voted for himself for best local politician multiple times—he didn't place among the finalists and will remain nameless—most of the voting seemed clean. As a result, we've decided not to name a winner in the worst ballot stuffer category this year. Plenty of shops, bands and individuals seem to have mounted campaigns to drum up votes on their behalf—perfectly legitimate—but no one seemed to have crossed the line into outright perfidy. At least not on such a grand scale as to merit public shaming.

We tossed out votes for national chains and personalities—this is Best of Buffalo, not best of anywhere—but not at the expense of locals who have gone big. A vote for Rochester-based Wegmans stays, for example, as do votes for Ani DiFranco or the Goo Goo Dolls. (Tim Horton's was the toughest call. The Ontario-based chain fared pretty well in the best coffee category, but, despite the nearly local connections, we decided it didn't count. In any case, it wouldn't have won first place.)

Votes that were nonspecific or too difficult to unravel (seriously, in "best facade": "that place across from where I got a parking ticket"—I mean, come on) also were not tallied. We do our best to arrive at an accurate reading of our readers' minds, but we can't do much with "don't remember," "what's his name" or "semdf gherkiin."







This year, for the first time, we asked our respondents to answer essay questions—best local scandal, biggest Buffalo pipedream, stupidest thing you did all year, etc. These made for good reading, leavening the sometimes tedious work of decoding and tallying votes. Here for, your reading pleasure, are some samples:

What's the stupidest thing you did all year?

"Revealed body parts at bars."

"Went swimming in a creek in the middle of February."

"Got married."

"Moved back to Buffalo!"

"Moved away."

"It involved a bottle of jamo, a rubber glove, a package of peeps and a shopping cart."

"Nothing. But in 2007 the stupidest thing I've done so far is fill out an online ballot."

"...got drunk, fell in a ditch (several times), tried to sing Oasis' "Wonderwall," played with fireworks, kept eating cherries marinated in Crown Royal—all in the same night."

Best Local Scandal:

Lots of winners here: Bucky Phillips, George Holt, the proposed downtown casino, teachers sleeping with students, Buffalo's school superintendent clashing with teachers and school board members...

But the number one vote-getter was US Congressman Tom Reynolds' handling of the Mark Foley scandal, as described by this respondent:

"Tom Reynolds bringing in a dozen children in to the press conference where he was going to talk about a sex scandal. I mean what was up with that? Awful."

Most Over-reported and Under-reported Stories:

The Bucky Phillips saga just edged out the October storm in the over-reported category. As ever, the proposed casino downtown placed high as both underreported and over-reported. (And, as always, we'll take that as a sign that we should keep writing about it.) The Albright-Knox deaccession also placed in both categories. Our readers think Bass Pro gets too much coverage.

The rise of dangerous crime in the city placed high in the under-reported voting, as did the city's high school dropout rate and poverty and housing issues in the city's most neglected neighborhoods. So did variations on "any good news in the city."

About a dozen voters agreed with this voter on the most under-reported story: "Total erosion of democratic process with control boards. Most people just think it's about taxes and spending."

Biggest Buffalo Pipedream:

A familiar litany with which to nurture one's cynicism: Bass Pro, waterfront development, the hotel on Elmwood and Forest, the Peace Bridge and its plaza, the casino, the removal of the Skyway, opening Main Street to car traffic. Many doubt that Bashar Issa will really renovate the Statler and build a new skyscraper downtown.

WHLD-1270, the Voice of Reason. A host of other good-intentioned projects that have failed or never materialized. Sigh.

Most Discouraging Sign That Nothing Ever Changes:

"No progress on the Bass Pro deal, no new bridge, no casino, complaints about a new business tower next to City Hall, no hotel on Elmwood, etc., etc., etc."

"Again putting all of Buffalo's hopes on one event, then that house of cards falling when that one event doesn't go as planned. See: Waterfront. There are other places to develop, you know?"

"The fact that they want to build a coal plant when we have an abundance of wind!"

"Buffalo Schools never seeming to improve."

"Re-electing the same politicians over and over again."

"Just go up and down East Ferry, East and West Utica, Bailey and the East Side and look at all the vacant and decrepit residences that should be bulldozed."

"The fact that you asked that question and nobody doubted it for a second."

Most Promising Sign That Buffalo Is Turning Around:

Writes one voter:

"Downtown is recovering all by itself. Buffalo is beginning to get projects without offering any incentives whatsoever. The Statler Towers are being renovated with no tax breaks...Labatt USA just moved here without asking anything. Vacant Class A office space downtown is nonexistent.

"The Main Place Mall food court is actually getting more restaurants. The Blue Cross building is moving into downtown—and the building they are vacating to do it already has a new owner and purpose. The waterfront is moving forward with no new taxpayer dollars. The Aud is ready to be knocked down, and more importantly, so is the Donovan building. The population of downtown Buffalo actually went up in 2006—and even if its less than 100 people, what a barrier to break to finally not be spiraling further and further down!

"How can you not be excited?"

A cautious amen to that.

verwhelming response as usual to this category, more evidence of what our readers do when given lots of choices. (Perhaps this is why the local politics categories get less traffic?)

Sometimes it seems the more things change, the more they stay the same, with Kuni's back on the list for best sushi, despite having closed and reopened in a different location, alongside Kibarashi, which took over at Kuni's old spot.

Best new restaurant finalists include the revamped (Bistro Europa was previously a small retail venue), the restored (North reopened the dining room in the classic Lenox Hotel) and the reimagined (Stillwater makes use of the glorious space that was Lord Chumley's).

Empire Grill and the Chocolate Bar bring exciting brand new builds to different sides of the city: The Chocolate Bar's downtown digs in the Hampton Inn showcase skilled metalwork, a decadent chocolate fountain and a continuous screening of *Charlie & the Chocolate Factory* (original version) playing on monitors in both bathrooms. The ambitious Empire Grill is a huge, multi-level place with an atrium and modern, openair feeling—all light and air as opposed to the Chocolate Bar's more sensual atmosphere.

The most genre-busting responses to our poll were found in the categories of best bar food, best Chinese, best late-night eats, best service and best steak.

For instance, the best bar food category takes us from the venerable Old Pink, with its famous steak sandwiches smothered in peppers and onions, to one of Buffalo's best-loved gay bars, Buddies II, which may be the only dance club to serve food and do a helluva job of it, to the cavernous Pearl St. Grill & Brewery, which also boasts a full menu and table service to boot.

Best steak sees the popular take-out joint Jim's Steak Out on the same list with one of the city's high-roller destinations, Buffalo Chophouse.

Equally incongruent are the nominees for best Chinese, from the Elmwood Village/Buff State area take-out favorite Great Wall to the one-time Michelinrated Ontario establishment Ming Teh, whose escargots in black bean sauce and reputation for authentic, gourmet Chinese food make it a destination restaurant for many on this side of the border.

Best late-night eats, if you follow our readers' recommendations, could land you at the considerably upscale Mother's, where you can usually order from both the dinner menu (think soft-shell crabs in season, filet mignon, smoked trout salad) and the bar menu (quesadillas, French fries, meatloaf sandwiches) until the wee hours; on the flip side, Buffalo's own local Tex-Mex chain Mighty Taco is nominated in the same category.

Finally, the finalists for best service prove that interpretation is everything, with the always bustling and super-efficient Pano's neck-and-neck with the sophisticated and sublimely elegant Rue Franklin.

Makes you wonder if it all depends on what the definition of "best" is after all. —k o'day



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et us now praise famous men and women—such convenient, and often willing, receptacles in which to pour our expectations and frustrations.

Too convenient really. What will our readers do, for example, when Erie County Executive Joel Giambra leaves office? Will you all continue to make him a perennial finalist in the worst politician category? (Maybe so: Former County Executive Ed Rutkowski got a few votes for worst politician this year.) Or will you turn back time, to the day when he was a perennial finalist in the best politician category? Certainly, whatever his political missteps, the county executive does not deserve a place among the finalists in the biggest local villain category, alongside Bucky Phillips and Altemio Sanchez. Neither do Pano or the Seneca Gaming Corporation, for that matter. Let's take a step back, people, and gain some perspective.

Your votes for local heroes and cheerleaders, on the other hand, seemed well considered. (Though gadabout Eric Starchild received a surprising number of votes for biggest local hero, as did "me" and variations on "who cares" and "aren't any.") Considered as partners or separately, Buffalo Police Officers Patty Parete and Carl Andolina were on a lot of people's minds.

As were the Buffalo Sabres, who routed every category in which they could possibly compete. Owner Tom Golisano placed in two categories all by himself: biggest local cheerleader and biggest local hero. Maybe, for the sake of Ralph Wilson and the Bills, we need to hold a Best of Buffalo poll in late autumn. As it is, the Bills received a scattering of votes from disgruntled fans for favorite local amateur team.

On the media: Except when the voters made their intentions crystal clear, we dropped votes that might have resulted in Artvoice making the final five in any category. So, for example, a lot of you voted generally for "Artvoice" for best print journalist; alas, we are individuals and not a collective, but we thank you for the compliment (or, as the case may be, for the brazen attempt to win a prize package). Our own Mike Niman placed anyway, along with a clutch of writers for the Buffalo News. Meanwhile, the voting for best blogger and best Web site was plagued by the same confusion as always: As an illustration, Buffalo Rising is not a blog, or a blogger-it's a Web site that hosts a community of contributors, staff and non-staff. Newell Nussbaumer, inasmuch as he writes tirelessly for Buffalo Rising, qualifies as a blogger. Right? Fix Buffalo and Buffalo Pundit are blogs, but the utility and popularity of both as sources of information sort of blur the line. Right?

Confusing. But Best of Buffalo voting is often a nightmare to decode. In a result that nearly derailed the whole Best of Buffalo enterprise, Sanjaya-style, car dealer Billy Fuccillo almost made the final five for best drag queen. Or maybe we don't know everything you all know.

ased on the voting in this category, you could creat a composite of the typical Artvoice reader. She looks for love in late-night bars; she steals wireless from her neighbors; she loves the Albright-Knox, inside and out; she rides her bike to the Japanese Gardens in Delaware Park on weekends; she frequents a triangle defined by Allentown, Chippewa and Bidwell Parkway, straying occasionally into the East and West Sides to take stock of the city's declining neighborhoods. She likes her restrooms glitzy and Italianate, but she appreciates the Old Pink vibe too. She attends a lot of fundraisers and festivals, but she's kind of a homebody.

But maybe it's more interesting to hear about the places people wish they could find in Buffalo. The three most common responses to our essay question about nightlife ("Describe the night spot you wish existed") were: 1) a bar tailored to the respondent's personality (e.g. a geek bar, a sports bar, a Coyote Ugly-esque bar, an alcohol-free bar); 2) a 24-hour joint with decent WiFi; 3) bring back the Continental.

Building, the Central Terminal, the Ellicott Square Building. The Webb Building placed in the "most promising" category—a result somewhat soured by the death of a construction worker on the project. The Aud placed in this category too, though \$10 million in state funds to demolish the thing makes its future seem less than bright. Optimism about the old AM&A building downtown was dealt a blow this week, too: Its out-of-town purchasers have backed off their renovation plans and put it up for sale.

The Granite Works received a nod of approval, earning a place on the list of finalists for best renovation in 2006; may it fill with tenants soon.

This is one of the best years for Sabres hockey in the team's history, so it's hardly surprising that so many people should vote for "a Sabres game" as one of the best places to take the family or out-of-town visitors. But you might as well offer a trip to the moon-I mean, where are you all getting tickets? On eBay at \$200 a pop? Maybe Buffalo's economy is turning around.

As for architecture, the all-time favorites never change: City Hall, the Guaranty



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



v today's pedestrian music fan, Buffalo is often referred to as the hometown of the Goo Goo Dolls, Ani DiFranco, 10,000 Maniacs (sort of) and the late Rick James. While these great talents serve as handy ambassadors due to their widespread popular success and fame, they represent only a sliver of the rich musical heritage of a city that's been home to songwriters ranging back from Harold Arlen ("Somewhere Over the Rainbow," sung by Judy Garland) to "Dyke" Arlester Christian ("Funky Broadway," sung by Wilson Pickett). The cultural and musical variety is rich here, and the roots run verv deep.

Today, the city is teeming with bands and performers of every stripe, and it's much easier than it has ever been before for a local act to get some press and airplay. There's more networking among performers, thanks to Web sites dedicated to local music, and also more small, home studios in which to make quality digital recordings. There's also MySpace, which makes it easier to reach the world and/or easier to get lost in the crowd. By the time it becomes common knowledge that a city outside the traditional music hubs of London. New York. Nashville and LA has a great local scene going, the phenomenon is usually past. What you get then are the wannabes who arrive from everywhere, like weeds. and choke out the native species as they struggle for gigs. Labels, radio DJs, music journalists and the like can try to milk it for a decade or more after that, and they often succeed in convincing people that there must be something in the water in Seattle, or Portland-or Glasgow for crying out loud. But the fact is, it doesn't come from the water.

All it really takes are talented, creative musicians, good venues and supportive fans to make a vibrant music scene. Right here, right now, we have all that and more. If you wait to be told about our scene through the mainstream media, chances are you will have missed the peak of it. So get out and support the venues, performers and bands our readers have nominated. It encourages them all to put out their best. And when they do, we all shine a little brighter. At least until *Rolling Stone* magazine finds out about it.

th all the stores that come and go, it's a wonder the number of retail establishments that have been around for ages, and that keep winning our Best of Buffalo polls year after year.

What's the secret? Is it location? Ambience? Professionalism? Luck? Whatever it is (and the formula is probably either a very simple or a mindboggling equation) we are lucky to have the tried and true existing side by side with the new and unproven. Should keep everybody on their toes, right?

This year we mourn the closing of some of those tried and true, like best CD/record store nominee Home of the Hits and best thrift shop nominee Don Apparel. Both establishments shut their doors for good this past year, though certainly not due to lack of loyal customers. We did not take them off the list of finalists—they were among the best in Buffalo right up to the moment they closed, after all.

But the beat goes on, and that same block of Elmwood has now gained the recently relocated Allentown Music (which, like the Lexington Coop, saw no reason to change a perfectly good name along with its location), a nominee for best music store, and opened up some prime storefront space for other brave entrepreneurs. Of course the Elmwood Strip boasts a majority of the nominees, but Allentown and the Hertel area are creeping up fast, and clothing stores, shoe stores, jewelry shops, tattoo parlors and hair salons from all over the city and the suburbs are represented in our poll.

A tour of the best produce nominees would take you from the farmer's market at Elmwood at Bidwell to Grant Street's Guercio & Sons to the Clinton-Bailey Market on the East Side.

Best butcher would take you all over the city with Federal Meats' various locations, and even into the realm of the imagination with Charlie the Butcher's disqualified nomination. (Charlie the Butcher is *not* a butcher, people—it's a restaurant.)

Best antique store nominees can be found from Allentown's the Antique Man to Clarence's huge Antique World to the Southtowns' Antique Mall, where you can find anything from kitsch to real home furnishings. Shops like CooCoo U and Sarah's Vintage & Antique Jewelry also fit the bill, leading buyers to Hertel Avenue and Williamsville, respectively.

So go on a shopping tour of our Best of Buffalo categories and see practically the entire Western New York area while you're at it. Only don't bring your credit card. It probably wouldn't be wise.

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Buffalo, the animals, or American bison as they are more properly called, are a little like Buffalonians, the people, in at least two ways: They conquer harsh winter storms by facing them head-on, and they like to gather in groups around cool watering holes.

Thankfully Buffalo, the city, is filled with cool places where its people can go to join the rest of the herd for a drink. Varied and plentiful, there's a bar to suit every drinker's taste in this town. From unassuming beer-and-a-shot corner joints where the proprietor still lives upstairs, to upscale, urbane nightclubs whose martini list alone makes Baskin-Robbins' selection seem skimpy—it's all right here.

This year, a couple of the top five new establishments-Blu Mirage and Chocolate Bar-were also among the top five upscale bars, according to our readers. The popular Mulligan's Brick Bar and Essex Street Pub both placed in the top five neighborhood pubs as well as top five dive bars-but this anomaly is less a reflection on the neighborhoods in which they're located as it is a testament to the quality of our dives. Meanwhile, seeming opposites Merlin's (best dive candidate) and Mother's (best upscale bar candidate) both placed in the top five old man bars-proving what? That money can't buy you youth?

Club Marcella, Roxy's and Buddies II placed in the top five for both gay- and lesbian-friendly bars. Q and the Cathode Ray got a special nod from the guys while Miss Kitty's and Adonia's also won the favor of the ladies.

Depending on your drinking preferences, you may want to note that there were no duplicates in three Best of Buffalo categories: best beer selection, best wine list, and best martini. Buffalo Brew Pub, Alternative Brews and Colter Bay, our readers say, are great places for suds; while Bacchus, as the name implies, is a primo place for vino, as is Shango—and also Toro. And when many of our readers think of a martini, their thoughts turn to the Shadow Lounge, Club Diablo or Cecilia's.

Part chemist, part psychologist, part priest or priestess, the Best of Buffalo bartender category is filled with some of the most highly skilled practitioners of this sacred art in all the world. They are the ones who make a trip to the bar an occasion, and their attentive skill is what can focus and refine a kaleidoscopic wall of booze into the most perfectly refined martini, the most exotic mojito, the most obnoxious Harvey Wallbanger, or the most flirtatious Sex on the Beach. We raise a glass to them all!

If you like to mix live music with your drink, you're also lucky to be in Buffalo. Here you can often catch a national act early, by Buffalo standards, at the Town Ballroom or Sportsmen's Tavern, then pop in to catch some indie rock at Mohawk Place, before winding things up on Allen Street, bouncing back and forth between Nietzsche's and Allen Street Hardware. That's probably why all these places landed in our top five.

Movers and groovers are getting down everywhere from Level to La Luna, while popular dance halls like Club Marcella and Roxy's still can't stop the music. Other boogiemen and women preferred edgy Club Diablo.

As you see from the nominees, there's also no shortage of places to practice the great drinking sports of bowling, shooting pool, singing karaoke and pumping money into the jukebox. And if you're young, you probably aren't really a hipster until you've operated the "antique" jukebox in the Old Pink Flamingo. It ain't an iPod, but hey, babe—take a walk on the wild side.

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or a city its size, Buffalo has an embarrassment of riches when it comes to the arts. Apart from 800-pound gorillas like the Albright-Knox, Shea's, Studio Arena and the Philharmonic, we're blessed with many smaller galleries, theaters and performance spaces where local visual, literary, musical and performance artists can share their work.

Many of these smaller venues also play host to internationally recognized artists and works in various realms, giving us the opportunity to remain well informed about what's happening on the global scene.

Our colleges and university also create an environment where younger people can explore their creative impulses. Many, in fact, stay here-recognizing the underground network of artists and venues here that can serve as a fertile environment in which to practice in their own particular field. Some of the individuals you see listed below are expats who had left for supposedly greener pastures, only to find they missed the green, green grass of home. This too is our gain, for when they return they tend to be wiser and more focused on work than hype.

Anyone who doubts Buffalo's interest in its arts scene need only review the uproar caused when the Albright-Knox moved to auction off many of its antiquities in an effort to focus on contemporary work. The fact that so many had such strong opinions, one way or the other, is proof that our cultural organizations are deeply ingrained in our sense of who we are as a city.

Our readers responded to our Best of Buffalo survey on the arts with a wideranging selection of talented individuals and organizations who are helping to carry us far beyond our image as an economically distressed, sports-crazed, snow-bound, gray, Rust Belt burg.

And while it may be true that there are fewer local wealthy philanthropists interested in pouring money into our cultural institutions than there used to be, there is a growing, enthusiastic, educated and hip crowd here who are less interested in expensive, gilded imports to our marble galleries than they are in creating and appreciating real, vibrant and thoughtfully creative, homegrown works of beautifully provocative art. It's all here, it's all good and it's all a part of what makes our city truly special.
