SERGEANT ALJOE TAKES FIRST STEP IN LAWSUIT AGAINST POLICE WHO KILLED HIS DOG IN WRONG **HOUSE RAID**

On February 15, 2017, a notice of claim was served on Buffalo and Tonawanda Police for the shooting death of a German Shepherd belonging to 37-year military veteran and Riverside homeowner, Sergeant First Class (retired) Gary Aljoe.

The dog, named 'Sarge' was shot and killed by Lieutenant Derek Scott of the Town of Tonawanda Police Department just before Christmas last year during a 'wrong house'

Artvoice obtained documents relating to the raid which led to the dog's death.

As ArtVoice reported in our January 5, 2017 edition, the warrant seem suggestive of false information being provided from a confidential informant who may have been seeking to avoid prosecution on other charges.

The warrant and other documents add doubt as to why officers raided Aljoe's Riverside household just before dawn.

A search warrant reveals that a confidential informant went with Buffalo Police Officers before Buffalo City Court Judge Thomas Amodeo and claimed he bought marijuana and heroin on two separate dates from a man at Aljoe's Ullman Street residence in December last year.

However, the informant was unable to describe the age, ethnicity, height, race or any other distinguishing features of the man he claimed he purchased rugs from. On the search warrant application as well as the warrant itself, the target of such warrant is listed as "first name unknown, last name unknown,

The house was raided but officers found no marijuana or heroin in the home.

Police allege there was cocaine residue found in a baggie - with a possible street value of 10 cents.

Aljoe's attorney, Matthew Albert believes small remnants of drugs are planted on fruitless raids to justify invasions that the Buffalo Police execute on 100's of innocent people's homes every year, the vast majority which do not yield any contraband - other than residue.

Furthermore, details as to where Sarge was, where his owners were upon entry, and why Sarge was shot is contradicted by officers at the scene. Tonawanda Lieutenant Scott, who shot the dog claimed the dog was laying on the couch in the living room when Sarge

advanced to the door upon the officers.

Officer Bartolotta, who the dog allegedly was attacking, said he was laying down in the doorway of the home.

The couch is at 10 feet from the doorway, according to Albert.

"It appears that about 20 armed officers stormed the residence of this proud Veteran, his son, and their beautiful German Shepherd as if they were storming the Beaches of Normandy," Alberty said. "However, the fact of the matter is Gary Aljoe is 60 plus years old and his son, Garrett Aljoe, weighs about 120 pounds. You could pick twenty random women from a sewing club and they would be able to control the scene without needing to resort to deadly force. Police killed this dog for a Christmas bounty. This was a cowardly act."

The dog was shot twice as police involved in the case said the dog was flailing around in pain after the first shot.

Albert said, "This begs the question why a second shot was needed."

Officers indicated that after the dog was killed they called for animal control, as opposed to having the unit present upon the

execution of the warrant to assist in controlling the dog while he was alive.

Buffalo Police standard policy is to call animal control only after a dog is shot and killed in order to pick up the corpses, as opposed to trying to help at the scene while the animal is still living.

While the first and last name, as well as race, ethnicity, age and any distinguishing features of the target of the warrant was unknown to police, and that no drugs were found at the raid which not only killed a dog but caused immense property damages and trauma to the Aljoe family (picture your own home being raided at 6:00 am one morning on the false word of a snitch) one thing is clear to Aljoe and his attorney: That dog was DOA as soon as the twenty officers raided his residence.

Armed with a ram as well as other weapons which would have been able to incapacitate the dog, police chose to shoot him on sight.

The next step in Aljoe's legal process is for Albert to have the minor possession charges dismissed against Garrett Aljoe (in whose

room the baggie with the 'residue' was found). Albert will argue that the warrant lacking even the race or any thing else about the target lacks relevant probable cause.

The angst is not over for the Aljoes however.


No police officer has ever been charged with animal cruelty for any of the hundreds of shooting deaths of dogs on fruitless wrong house drug raids no matter how compelling the evidence is to support the fact that the kills were unnecessary.

However, men like Garrett Aljoe are always charged for every last shred of residue or plant stem that police could possibly find in the families' residences.

Aljoe returns to Court on Wednesday, March 2 before Judge Fiorella where Albert is attempting to have charges against him dismissed. Upon the Aljoes' being examined by the City Attorney's Office pursuant to the now filed Notices of Claim, it is Albert's intent to file a Federal lawsuit against the relevant parties.



OFFICER ACCUSED OF BREAKING NURSE'S ANKLE HAD PRIOR COMPLAINTS, ATTY ALBERT **CRITICIZES POLICE FOR STONEWALLING**



Buffalo lawyer Matt Albert has emerged as the local champion of the underdog – both human and canine as he tackles tough cases of police brutality and wrong house raids that kill dogs during the raids.

On February 2, 2017, Artvoice reported that Buffalo Police Officer Mark Vara was accused in U.S Federal Court to have grabbed a Buffalo woman from inside her home and threw her on the concrete sidewalk after handcuffing her.

The woman, Christine Townsend, 43, of Buffalo, originally called police for help because roaming pit bulls were trying to get into her home.

Vara is accused of pulling Townsend, a registered nurse and animal rescuer, from inside her Riverside home and pushing her down her porch stairs. She fractured her ankle.

Vara, in his deposition in the lawsuit, admitted he had three complaints against him during his nine years as a tenured police officer that did get the attention of Internal Affairs.

On September 29, 2016, in deposition testimony, Townsend's Attorney and Civil Rights specialist Matthew Albert, asked Vara what the nature of those complaints were. Vara responded that they were "usually just like verbal."

Vara chose not to answer questions about the nature of why he was investigated only saying the complaints made my citizens against him were determined as unfounded by Internal Investigations of the Buffalo Police Department.

Albert deposed Officer Kelly Craig, Vara's partner who admitted she had been with him on incidents where he was accused of excessive force and/or misconduct.

When questioned by Albert, Craig said she did not remember any specifics of Vara's conduct.

In fact she was able to recall very little of many events and at one point she swore she could not recall her own phone number.

In addition to complaints by citizens, Vara said

he received scrutiny from Internal Affairs relating to his "time at work".

Albert filed a motion to compel disclosure of Vara's Internal Affair Records.

That motion is pending before the Honorable Magistrate Judge Kenneth Schroeder, Jr. in the Western District of the United States Federal

An Investigative Post story of February 15, reported that officers avoided discipline for 58 out of 62 charges against them for excessive force by civilians during a three-year period leading up to this year.

Townsend is also suing Buffalo Police Chief Daniel Derenda who, as policy maker, is accused of covering up for the misconduct of officers by not investigating complaints of wrongdoing.

Albert issued a subpoena for Derenda to speak about these matters for Friday, March 3, 2017; however, Assistant Corporation Counsel David Lee indicated he seeks to quash the subpoena.

"Efforts by the city's law office to aid city officials to avoid questions of accountability is wrong" said Albert. "The city spends taxpayers' money trying to hide the truth, delay lawsuits, and avoid having politicians and police officers answer questions. It is one thing to defend the case on the merits. However, the city routinely seeks to avoid having police officers answer questions relating to alleged misconduct, which frankly, is fascist and cowardly, and not a transparent or even legal way to operate city government."

In another high profile and ongoing Civil Rights lawsuit, Buffalo Peace Officer Matthew Jaskula was caught on camera severely beating an inmate that was in his care and custody who wasn't resisting. The City of Buffalo fought to keep that video from getting out to the public.

Last week, Judge Bannister sided with the City and stated the video could not be released until Jaskula's criminal case is over.

Albert said he plans to announce every act of police misconduct, including the fact that the city is dishonoring subpoenas and directing officers not to testify and instead seek protective orders and preferential treatment over the rest of the citizenry.

The city has yet to answer Albert's motion to compel in the Vara deposition.

"One thing is certain," Albert says, "the City will not turn over any piece of evidence in accordance with the law unless they are absolutely forced to do so."

CUOMO'S STATE PARK "LODGE" A MOCKERY OF OLMSTED PLAN

Gov. Andrew Cuomo's controversial proposed "lodge" on Goat Island in the Niagara Falls State Park has been scaled up in size, according to design sketches posted by USA Niagara this week.

USA Niagara is a subsidiary of Empire State Development, the state development agency charged with "encouraging growth and renewal of the tourism industry in the City of Niagara Falls," according to its mission statement.

According to www.niagaraexperiencecenter. org, a website maintained by USA Niagara, and updated recently with this new information, "The lodge will feature three stories of guest accommodations, 250 rooms in total, with a wraparound veranda offering breathtaking views of the Falls and State Park... Additional features of the lodge include an elegant main dining hall, smaller private dining rooms and a family health spa with a swimming pool and 'green roof."

At 250 rooms, the lodge is far larger than what Governor Cuomo and USA Niagara president Christopher J. Schoepflin have told the public recently.

Schoepflin said, "The lodge the governor envisions would have 75 to 100 rooms - 'a very boutique property."

The news of a 100-room lodge on Goat Island caused an outcry of opposition decrying it as not in keeping with Olmsted's plans.

The first mention of plans for a lodge on Goat Island came in a never-acted-on, 2014 USA Niagara Development Corp. Request for Proposals (RFP) which called for developers to consider proposing retrofitting the small, historic Calvert Vaux Carriage House on Goat Island into a "small inn."

If built on Goat Island, it would be the first overnight accommodations ever developed in the Niagara Falls State Park, and a plan that was specifically opposed by Frederick Law Olmsted who designed the park and whose name is invoked in the state's advertisements for the park.

GOAT ISLAND LODGE'S LONG JOURNEY FROM "SMALL INN" TO HUGE TOURIST RESORT

It started out small, then got bigger, much bigger, thanks to the efforts of USA Niagara.

First brought to light in a largely-overlooked 2014 USA Niagara Development Corp. Request for Proposals (RFP) that called for bids to retrofit a small building on Goat Island in the Niagara Falls State Park as "a signature dining facility, an outdoor recreation outfitting facility, and/or a small inn," Gov. Andrew Cuomo's proposed "lodge" for the state-owned and operated park has been scaled up to, according to information recently obtained by the Reporter, a sprawling tourist attraction and resort destination in its own right on the former Olmsted preserve. The RFP, titled "Outdoor Recreation Programming and Related Facilities" and available on-line, calls for applications from vendors in a position "to establish, operate, and maintain a program of outdoor recreation activities and associated capital/real estate facilities in New York State Parks... along roughly 11 miles of waterfront on the Upper and Lower Niagara River in Niagara Falls, New York. The intent of the effort is to expand the amount/types of activities and experiences available to tourists and local residents in order to assist in growing visitorship and extending stays in the City of Niagara Falls, as well as to enhance the quality of life here."

Consisting mostly of the standard boilerplate tourism industry promotion language used by government officials in their never-ending attempts to address the perennial problem of the city of Niagara Falls not effectively capitalizing on the eight million tourists who come here every year, the USA Niagara document that calls for the Calvert Vaux Carriage House on Goat Island to be converted into a "small inn" didn't receive any winning bids.

It quite possibly didn't receive any bids at all, since of the nine programmatic activity areas listed in the RFP, ranging from "Trail

Sports" and "Rappelling and Rock Climbing Activities" to "Zip Line Tour," the only activity to be rated "highly controversial" is the "Adaptive Reuse at Niagara Falls State Park: Available Park Buildings" plan which of course comprises the "small inn" concept. All of the others are rated "Noncontroversial" to "Moderately controversial."

It's striking that as long as two years ago, USA Niagara intuited that, under the euphemistally-named category "Assumed Complexity," any overnight lodging located in the Olmsted-designed Niagara Falls State Park would prove "highly controversial."

USA Niagara is a subsidiary of Empire State Development, the state development agency,



and as such, is the primary entity charged here with "support and promotion of economic development initiatives in Niagara Falls by leveraging private investment and encouraging growth and renewal of the tourism industry in the City of Niagara Falls," according to its mission statement.

One of USA Niagara's flagship projects intended to enhance tourism and jumpstart the revitalization of Niagara Falls is the Niagara Experience Center, "the primary (heritage) interpretive center for the Falls, and the best place to experience the story of this extraordinary natural wonder," which has been in the works seemingly since the falls were just a trickle over the gorge at Lewiston. In this role, USA Niagara maintains a website for the Niagara Experience Center.

Breathtakingly, the "small inn" from two years ago, buried deep within a USA Niagara RFP, has morphed into a huge hotel/spa/ outdoor events center as described on the Experience Center website. The narrative reads:

"The family-oriented Niagara Lodge will raise the bar for visitor accommodations in and around Niagara Falls. It is conceived of as a "grand lodge" for the 21st century, merging the heartwarming, rustic grandeur of the Old World lodges in America's National Parks with contemporary design updates and state-of-the-art guest amenities. The lodge will feature three stories of guest accommodations, 250 rooms in total, with a wraparound veranda offering breathtaking views of the Falls and State Park. One of the lodge's most impressive interior features is its 'Great Hall,' a multistory atrium with exposed wooden rafters, a dramatic stone fireplace and a floor-to-ceiling wall of windows. Additional features of the lodge include an elegant main dining hall, smaller private dining rooms and a family health spa with a swimming pool and 'green roof."

Note that while this USA Niagara-hosted website cites "250 rooms in total," USA Niagara president Christopher J. Schoepflin is quoted in a Buffalo News article of three weeks ago as saying, "The lodge the governor envisions would have 75 to 100 rooms - 'a very boutique property.'"

So from 250 rooms, the lodge has strategically shrunk to 75-100 rooms. Is it to mushroom to 1000 rooms when built on Goat Island in a couple of years?

DELAWARE NORTH ASSURED OF NIAGARA LODGE THANKS TO CAMPAIGN CONTRIBUTIONS TO CUOMO

Eight – by some accounts, nine – million tourists visit Niagara Falls State Park every

They access the world-famous attraction from two directions on a dedicated roadway, park on one of 1,500 parking spaces, tour Cave of the Winds and ride Maid of the Mist, dine at Top of the Falls restaurant, pavilion Snack Bar or one of four food booths scattered around the park, purchase souvenirs at one of two gift shops, perhaps thumb some quarters into the coin-operated binoculars perched next to the grand waterfalls, and then get back into their vehicles and leave without any need or reason to enter and spend money in the city of Niagara Falls next door.

Meanwhile, the city of Niagara Falls suffers from some of the highest rates of per capita poverty (US Census), violent crime (FBI) and taxation (The Tax Foundation) in the state.

New York State (read: Albany) has successfully captured the parking, gift and souvenir sales, restaurant and food service and other assorted small fees from operations in Niagara Falls State Park, extracting nearly \$20 million in tourist dollars every year, accruing to the state instead of the local economy.

Now they want more.

With the announced plan by Gov. Cuomo to build a "lodge" on Goat Island in the park, which in reality has been revealed to be a huge hotel with pool, dining rooms, spa/ salon and amphitheater, it's clear that now the state wants to compete with the overnight lodging market that's just getting a foothold downtown. And you don't need a crystal ball to know who he has in mind to operate that

Top of the Falls and other amenities in the park are run by multinational casino/sports venue/hotel and restaurant conglomerate Delaware North Companies of Buffalo, NY, pursuant to a \$10.2 million agreement with State Parks, commencing on July 1, 2002, to operate food, beverage and gift shop concessions in the Niagara Falls State Park, with a contract end date of Dec. 31, 2121.

What a tidy little package it would make for

Kalaloch at Olympic National Park in the state of Washington has 10 lodge rooms, 6 motel rooms, 4 motel suites, 40 cabins and 6 duplex cabins. Wouldn't this look iust grand on Goat Island?

Gov. Cuomo to extend Delaware North's lease on the park in 2121 just in time for the grand opening of the Niagara Lodge.

Not to mention payback for the \$25,000 a plate private fundraising dinner that Delaware North owner Jeremy Jacobs, Sr., hosted for him at Jacobs' opulent East Aurora estate on September 10, 2014, the day after his victory in the Democratic primary, and the numerous other campaign contributions that the billionaire hospitality magnate has made over the years.

As it turns out, Delaware North appears to be a perfect fit for running the proposed hotel/resort complex in Niagara Falls State Park, given that they already have extensive interests elsewhere at similar locations. In fact, the "Parks and Resorts" division of Delaware North administers facilities at upwards of 18 national and state parks, including Yellowstone, Sequoia, Grand Canyon, Shenandoah and Kings Canyon National Parks.



In a lawsuit against the United States of America, Delaware North attempted to retain some of the historic place names of Yosemite National Park, after having been booted out of the same. The 302-room Tenaya Lodge is still operated by them, however, located outside the park gates.



The 358-room Yavapai Lodge, operated by Delaware North, overlooking the Grand Canyon, may serve as a model for the proposed Niagara Lodge.

They operate exclusive, upscale resort hotels at Geneva-on-the-Lake (Ohio), Harrison Hot Springs (British Columbia, Canada), something called Peaks of Otter Lodge (Bedford, Virginia) and the swanky Gideon Putnam Resort at Saratoga Springs, NY.

The Gideon Putnam contract was awarded to Delaware North on July 7, 2007 by then-State Parks Commissioner Carol Ash, winning over 20 competing firms.

Six months before that, on Nov. 1, 2006, and one week before election day, Jeremy Jacobs Sr. made his maximum \$2,000 campaign contribution to gubernatorial candidate Eliot Spitzer. On the very same day, with the polls predicting a certain landslide for Spitzer, Alice Jacobs kicked in another \$2,000. Then Charles Jacobs came up with a \$2,000 donation to seal the Spitzer victory. Also on Nov. 1, and not to leave anything to chance, Joan Jacobs chipped in with \$2,000. Kimberly Jacobs, \$2,000 on Nov. 1 to buy even more

democracy. Lisann Jacobs, \$1,000, maybe she was a little short that day. Back on track with Louis Jacobs, \$2,000. See a pattern yet? Margaret Jacobs, \$2000. Altogether at least \$15,000 that came in as separate donations from eight different members of the Jacobs family on the same day, one week before Spitzer's certain victory.

According to a Nov. 18, 2014 article in Buffalo weekly The Public, "In the three months prior to his election, (Cuomo) received a series of \$5,000+ contributions not only from Jeremy Sr. and his wife Margaret, but also from every one of their six children (Jeremy Jr., Lisann, Louis, Charles, Margaret Reichenbach, and Katie Robinson), plus five of their children's spouses (Alice, Bruce Platt, Joan, Kimberly, and John Reichenbach)."

Also, from The Public, "In 2010, the Jacobs family did not bother to bundle smaller contributions to Cuomo — Jeremy and Margaret just cut him twin \$50,000 checks."

Thanks to powerful billionaires like Jacobs and corrupt politicians like Cuomo, the best the young people of Niagara Falls have to look forward to is flipping burgers at some "Niagara Lodge" in Albany's park.

USA NIAGARA PROMOTES NIAGARA LODGE WITH IMAGES LINKED TO DELAWARE NORTH

If there were any remaining doubts in anyone's mind that the proposed Niagara Lodge on Goat Island in Niagara Falls State Park is earmarked for Jeremy Jacobs' Delaware North worldwide empire, what follows should dispel them.

Two images portraying the embattled hotel/ resort have been posted by local economic development agency USA Niagara at its Niagara Experience Center website.

Several other images depict the Niagara Experience Center, but it's the two hotel images that are most significant.

The images were created by a company called BRC Imagination Arts of Burbank, California.

According to its website, BRC "is an experience design and production agency that 'Turns Brands Into Destinations'. For over three decades, many of the world's most iconic brands and cultural institutions have asked us to bring their stories to life and create unforgettable memories for their guests."

Among BRC's dozens of clients are Cleveland's Rock and Roll Hall of Fame, the Grand 'Ol Opry, the Cirque De Soleil, Abbey Road Studios, the Empire State Building Observatory, Knott's Berry Farm, the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library, Naples Botanical Garden and the Kennedy Space Center.

Clearly, Niagara Falls State Park will soon be added to that list, if USA Niagara, Delaware North and BRC have anything to say about it.

A March 29, 2016 document on the BRC website is titled, "THE SHUTTLE LAUNCH EXPERIENCE - KENNEDY SPACE CENTER," and subtitled "Attraction Concept, Design & Overall Creative Direction by BRC Imagination Arts in association with NASA – Kennedy Space Center and Delaware North Companies, Parks & Resorts."

Members of the 41-person BRC team that collaborated with Delaware North in creating the Kennedy Space Center attraction included the following job titles: Project Manager, Creative Director/Production Designer, Media Director, Concept & Story, Concept Art Director, Music Composer, Visual Effects Supervisor, Lighting Designer, Concept Artist, Storyboard Artist, Interiors Designer, you get the idea. Twelve Delaware North staffers, 8 of which are identified as either Directors or Managers, are listed. Scores of astronauts are listed as consultants.

To summarize: A subsidiary of a New York State government agency, USA Niagara, has utilized two watermarked images created by a private company, BRC, which has worked previously and closely with Delaware North to establish a major (1.5 million visitors a year) tourist attraction, the Kennedy Space Center, to promote a controversial hotel project in the Niagara Falls State Park long before any official public hearings or comment periods have been held on the matter.

Delaware North, USA Niagara, or both, engaged BRC to create images of the future development in the state park.

Again, USA Niagara, a government agency,

on one of its official websites, slyly adopted and displayed the work of a private company with a direct interest in the outcome of the Niagara Lodge issue.

Forgive us for saying so, but it certainly appears as if BRC and Delaware North are way ahead of us on this game.

Was BRC paid for the two images? What else has BRC, or Delaware North for that matter, done to lock down the Niagara Lodge contract, with the behind-closed-doors cooperation of USA Niagara, that the public is, as yet, unaware of?

Other than make large campaign contributions to Governor Andrew Cuomo, that is.



LOTS OF MYSTERY SURROUNDS GOAT ISLAND LODGE PLAN

What did Sam Hoyt say to Dennis Virtuoso last Tuesday in a phone call to convince the Niagara County legislator from Niagara Falls to pull his resolution opposing Gov. Andrew Cuomo's controversial plan to build a world class lodge on Goat Island?

Well, true to form, Hoyt, regional vice president of super-secretive Empire State Development, could not be reached to give his side of the conversation, but according to Virtuoso, Hoyt asked him to pull his resolution from consideration at the legislature's regular session because the lodge plan was as good as dead and there would be three or four site proposals to come and aggressive public input.

So Virtuoso tabled his resolution and a text to Niagara Falls Council member Kristen Grandinetti from a Cuomo aide, probably Hoyt, quieted opposition at last week's council meeting when she said the governor had backed off a Goat Island lodge and more locations and proposals would be forthcom-

As everybody now knows, the efforts last week to stifle public opposition were successful to a point, but the next day Hoyt's boss and Cuomo's top economic development chief, Howard Zemsky, said Goat Island remains a possibility for a lodge along with three other state parks.

So what does it all mean? We know that Empire State Development (Cuomo, Zemsky, Hoyt) and USA Niagara are as slippery as a wet Goat Island rock.

Transparency is not a word in their vocabulary and last week's shenanigans to muffle political opposition is an example of the dirty tricks they employ to mislead the public, whether with the Hamister Hotel fiasco or a lodge on Goat Island.

You can't believe them or trust them, as Virtuoso and Grandinetti found out last week.

In the larger scheme, what's going on with this save-Niagara Falls lodge plan being pushed by Cuomo in a state park that would be a bonanza for the developer who gets the deal and a real blow to downtown Niagara Falls businesses that hope to lure tourist dollars, not lose them to a tax-exempt lodge and the favored developer.

There are lodge designs on the Niagara USA website that are strikingly similar to other plans by a company that does work for mega-political contributor and developer Delaware North. Could Delaware North, a company that tops \$3 billion, be the developer that Cuomo favors for the lodge, a company that has been a strong contributor to the governor who will be seeking a third term next year?

And does anyone really believe that Goat Island, in all its pristine beauty, is off the table? Think of the concession value for a 100-room or more lodge on Goat Island with people likely staying for three or four days and never visiting downtown Niagara Falls to shop, dine, or sightsee? It would be virtual gold mine for the developer who would be forever grateful to the political forces that delivered the prize.

Not jumping to conclusions, mind you, just saying what a lot of insiders are thinking about the Goat Island lodge. Given the secrecy that governs the state's development agencies, it may be some time before we know the whole story. But it is clear from Zemsky's remarks contradicting what Hoyt told Virtuoso that Goat Island is still in the game.

State Sen. Robert Ortt and Assemblyman Angelo Morinello have joined the chorus of political opposition to a Goat Island lodge and even Mayor Paul Dyster has wavered from the Cuomo line, although we'll see how long he holds up if the governor stays the course.

Anyway, for what it is worth, Virtuoso plans to file his resolution opposing a Goat Island lodge at the March 21 legislature meeting, although unless something happens soon in the way of RFPs from the state, the public could be in the dark on what's next. But something is coming, you can sure, in the wake of Zemsky's remarks last week that the state has not given up on a state park lodge and Goat Island is still in play.

EMPIRE STATE DEVELOPMENT MUM ON LAWSUIT COSTS ON CANALSIDE CONTRACTOR 'ILLEGAL' FIRING

If there is one thing consistent about Empire State Development--that's Gov. Andrew Cuomo's economic development agency for those who might not know--it is a lack of transparency, from the Buffalo Billion program currently under federal investigation to the long-delayed Hamister Hotel project in Niagara Falls and now, most recently, the proposed "world-class" lodge for Goat Island State Park that is now mired in controversy because nobody but the governor and his development minions--and possibly a secret developer--seems to want.

But there's a big story still unfolding on the cost to taxpayers to defend the wrongful termination lawsuit filed by the DiPizio Construction Company of Buffalo against the state over being essentially fired from the \$20 million replica canal project at Canalside four years ago for allegedly not being able to deliver the job on time, a claim the company, with a 37-year history, is fighting in the courts.

I filed nine FOIL requests with secretive Empire State Development more than a year ago to find out how much state taxpayers have paid to the Buffalo law firm of Phillips Lytle to defend the Erie Canal Harbor Development Corporation (ECHDC) against the lawsuit.

It wasn't until last August that I finally received something more than "we're working on your request." According to that response I received last August, the firm had billed the state \$1,987,779.89 through August of 2015 and been paid \$1,640,887 through August of 2016. But for the record, the case is still moving through the courts and DiPizio has won at least one major ruling in its favor at the appellate level and a trial is looming in a few weeks on whether or not ECHDC managers had board approval to fire the company.



Rosanne DiPizio is suing the state for illegally firing her construction company for delays in the ice rink work, when it was actually the state, she says, that designed the project improperly. She helped the state correct the design flaws, but was terminated in order to shift blame away from state officials' numerous ad costly design blunders.

In other words, the meter is still ticking on the cost which could well be approaching \$3 million by now. That's \$3 million in taxpayer dollars in a case that is far from over.

On Feb. 24, I submitted a Freedom of Information Law request to Empire State Development asking for the latest numbers on the legal cost to defend the suit. Five business days later, as required by FOIL, I received a response. The response was pretty much the same as the nine I received last year before they finally sent some numbers.


ESD acknowledged receipt of the FOIL and said it is considering the request.

My best guess is that within 10 business days, as required by law, I will receive another email saying about the same thing, that the request is being considered and we'll keep you posted.

In the meantime, the legal costs continue to mount and short of a settlement, which many thought should have happened long ago, the tab could soon approach--if it hasn't already--\$4 million to defend a controversial dismissal that resulted in the hiring of a Rochester developer to finish the job, a firm with connections to former Lt. Gov. Robert Duffy,

a former Rochester mayor and police chief who is now head of the Rochester Business

But, as I said at the beginning of this report,

Empire State Development can keep a secret, especially when it comes to how it spends taxpayer dollars, and Gov. Cuomo could be safe from the truth on this story until after he runs for a third term next year, as expected.

THE EXPENSIVE WRONGFUL TERMINATION AND RACKETEERING LAWSUIT AGAINST EMPIRE STATE DEVELOPMENT AT CANALSIDE

In 2015, DiPizio Construction filed a civil racketeering lawsuit claiming Empire State Development Corp. illegally terminated the company's \$19.8 million contract to build the ice rink, old-style canals and footbridges at Canalside.

Dipizio did more than half of the work before they were fired. Pike Construction finished the project.

In November 2011, DiPizio Construction outbid Pike and four other companies to build the ice rink, at Canalside. DiPizio's low bid of \$19.8 million was \$3 million lower than what state engineers projected.

Construction began in May 2012.

Mark E. Smith, construction project manager for the harbor development corporation, disputed frequently with company CEO Rosanne DiPizio over design changes on the project, over which materials could be used and over the disposal of contaminated soil.

In July 2013, the state terminated its agreement with DiPizio accusing DiPizio of "deficient work" on the project, which was still under construction at that time.

State officials claim DiPizio was unable to complete the project properly or on time.

Company CEO, Rosanne DiPizio said "design problems, weather problems and the state's construction people" caused the delays.

Travelers Casualty and Surety Co. - the DiPizios' performance bonding company said delays on the ice rink job were caused by

the state's poorly designed plans(which had to be modified) and state officials wrongly terminated DiPizio Construction from the ice rink job and should have allowed the DiPizios to complete it.

In September 2013, Travelers hired Pike Construction of Rochester for \$11.5 million to complete the work.

DiPizio claims state officials, notably Sam Hoyt, regional president of Empire State Development, Smith and others, through wire fraud and mail fraud - created a false paper trail attempting to show the company was incompetent.


DiPizio claims state officials really wanted the contract turned over to politically connected Pike which has given tens of thousands in donations to Gov. Andrew M. Cuomo and Lt. Gov. Kathy Hochul.

As proof of the host of boondoggle design errors, after taking over the project Pike was delayed eight months because of damage to concrete that was the result of a harbor development company design error.

DiPizio also filed a state court lawsuit alleging DiPizio Construction was wrongly terminated.

While Pike successfully completed the project in 2014, with legal fees, and cost overruns from wrong design, the project cost taxpayers millions more than it likely would have if DiPizio had not been terminated.

Now the question to be determined in court is did the state improperly terminate DiPizio, and if so, how and more significantly, why?

TANGO WITH BOLÉO

Moshe Shulman and his friends bring their heat to The Friends of Vienna



ccording to Wikipedia, in tango dancing a boléo is: "A sharp movement of the leg often interrupted or suspended. The woman's lifts her foot from the floor and it flies to the side and wraps around her standing leg in front of her knee."

The Friends of Vienna will stretch the limits of their traditional comfort zone when they open their spring season on Sunday March 5 at 3:30pm in the Unity Church, 1243 Delaware Avenue. Long known during the past forty years for their presentation of beloved classics of the chamber music literature, the Friends of Vienna (FOV) have developed an enviable reputation in the past few years of programming challenging works by 20th and 21th century composers, including several newly commissioned works by cutting-edge composers, such as the talented young Turkish composer and vocalist, Esin Gündüz.

For their program this Sunday afternoon, the FOV have invited Boléo, a string quartet dedicated to the performance of music from the vast repertoire of works composed in the style of the Argentine tango, both traditional and nuevo. The driving force behind Boléo is the multi-talented, laid-back Israeli, Moshe Shulman who performs on the violin, viola, and accordion as well as the bandoneón, a South American concertina that is essential to performing tango music.

So, just how does a guy from Israel emerge as the very popular face of tango music on the Niagara Frontier? "I first got interested in tango music when I lived in Rochester, in the winter of 2007" says Moshe. "As you know, it gets dark very early during winter in this area. Since I did not, and still do not go into bars, I had to think of an activity. I said to myself, 'Let's see, what I can challenge myself with and what have I been afraid of doing for so many years?' Dancing was the answer, tango dancing was the option. Right after my first tango dance lesson, I bought an accordion for \$200 on craigslist in order to play the music I had heard in that dance lesson. At that time, an accordion was another challenge since it was new to me and my piano skills were humble. I found myself 3 to 4 hours a day on the accordion feeling my



way through the songs".

"After three years of playing the accordion, I got an option to go to Argentina to see if the bandoneon would be a similar challenge as accordion. It was much more difficult, not only in price and availability, but also technically. Bandoneon is a kind of concertina where each button sounds differently when pulling and pushing. There is no keyboard and no reason or pattern for how the buttons are placed. I had to feel my way in complete darkness".

"I co-created Boléo in 2015 with the help of the Cuban born violinist Lazara Martinez Nelson, the proprietress of the Pausa Art House, Buffalo's best venue for experiencing music in an intimate setting", says Moshe. "I formed my earlier group, the Tango Orkestra when I got back from Buenos Aires in 2012. My idea for Boléo was to create a typical

string quartet that will play non-typical classical music, like arrangements of any music that has dance quality in it. It could either be an excerpt from Swan Lake arranged for two violins, cello and accordion, Piazzolla's Five Sensations for string quartet and bandoneon, or Mexican, Cuban and tango arrangements for string quartet. Most of the arrangements are made by me".

While the FOV are eagerly anticipating getting down and, well sexy, with Moshe and the other members of his quartet, including his wife Miranda, a violinist, along with the versatile BPO principal second violin Antoine Lefebvre, and the internationally touring Fredonia School of Music cellist Natasha Farny, in the strictly tango half of the program, there is yet another very welcome aspect to this program.

Guitarist James Piorkowski, distinguished

professor in the Fredonia School of Music will join the members of Boléo in a what appears to be the Buffalo area premiere of the very prolific Italian composer Mario Castelnuovo-Tedesco's most popular chamber work, his 1950 Guitar Quintet Op. 143. While the composer fled the rising tide of anti-Semitic fascism in his native Italy in 1939 to pursue a career that paid the bills as a very successful in-house composer for films at MGM, a position that he won at least in part to the efforts of his friend, the great violinist Jascha Heifitz. he had already established himself as the leading modern classical composer of works featuring the guitar. His exquisitely eloquent Guitar Concerto No. 1 in D major, Op. 99 (1939) has rightly been one of the competition set pieces for the now long running biennial JoAnn Falletta International Guitar Concerto Competition.







WNED|WBFO is proud to announce that it will serve as the new presenter of the Artie Awards, which have recognized excellence in Buffalo theater since 1991. The 27th Annual Artie Awards will take place on Monday, June 5 at Shea's 710 Theatre.

Beginning in May of 1991, when the first Arties ceremony took place at Garvey's Restaurant on Pearl Street, all 26 editions of the Arties were presented by this publication, which playfully gave the awards their name. This move to a new presenter is auspicious and historic.

For all 26 years of the Arties, which I founded, I have produced the event with Artvoice founder, Jamie Moses. We were blessed to have the late Michael Hake as musical director for 25 years and tremendous support for many years from Deborah Ellis. I have also hosted the event with various co-hosts for all 26 years. I will do so again this June, and Jamie will continue as co-producer. What is new is that WBFO's recent expansion of an "Arts & Culture News Desk" inspired Jamie and me to approach the trusted and culturally oriented media outlet with the idea of becoming the



new Artie presenter.

"Broadway's Tony Awards have been going for 70 years, and we want the same for Buffalo's Artie Awards," notes Moses. "The Arties are very dear to us and to the theater community. The consistent commitment to arts and culture by WNED|WBFO will ensure they will continue for years to come."

Moses also notes that the Arties celebration has grown over the years, and the same period of time has seen changes in print media.

"Since moving to Shea's 710 Theatre, the event has become more successful than ever," Moses observes. "The celebration attracts larger crowds and requires more time, resources, and manpower to produce. WNED/WBFO has the resources to take on an event of this size and stature."

And so, Artvoice has proudly passed the Artie torch on to WNED/WBFO.

Over the span of 26 years, more than 500 Arties have been presented to local theater artists, and the event has raised over \$500,000 for AIDS-related charities, selling red ribbons at local theater performance in the weeks leading up to the event. WNED/ WBFO has committed to continue the charitable aspect of the event.

To administer the Arties, a dedicated committee of volunteers spends hundreds of nights at the theater each year in order to gauge the quality of the performances and productions, culminating in the determination of nominees and the announcement of winners on Artie night. Over the years, the Arties have truly established an identity and brand of their own and have become respected and loved by the theater community.

The move to WNED/WBFO would not have happened without the enthusiastic support of President and CEO Donald K. Boswell.

"All of us at WNED|WBFO firmly believe that the thriving theater scene is one of the best things about Buffalo and deserves to be celebrated in first class fashion," said

Boswell. "We are proud to be a part of this iconic Buffalo celebration which provides the theaters with increased visibility and a heightened sense of community. We are also fortunate that we have the staff and volunteers needed to support the event."

For my part, I am proud of the longevity of the Artie Awards and also of my personal association with WNED|WBFO going back many years. Don Boswell reminds me that this fall marks the 25th anniversary of that Friday morning when I first went on the air as co-host of 'Theater Talk' on WBFO with Jim Santella. I continue to co-host the program with Peter Hall of WNED-FM. The depth of my involvement at WNED/WBFO has continued to expand, along with the station's cultural offerings. This year, I will once again host the 2017 Shaw Festival Preview on WNED-TV. The station airs theater performances via such PBS programs as "Great Performances" and "Live from Lincoln Center," including "Act One" and "Hamlet," and such theatrically oriented programs as "Hamilton's America."

Jamie and I feel delighted and privileged to continue the contributions of the Artie Awards with the new presenter of the event, WNED/WBFO.







NO PLAYOFF RUN THIS YEAR DISASTAROUS WEEKEND LEAVES SABRES REELING

echnically and mathematically speaking, the Buffalo Sabres are still alive for a 7th or 8th seed and entry into this year's Stanley Cup playoffs.

That being said, it was an exasperating exercise watching the Sabres put together a bit of a run, including a thrilling Saturday matinee win at home against St. Louis before a full throated, playoff atmosphere raucous crowd, only to turn in a tired and lackluster performance against Chicago one night

Fans leaving the arena following the St. Louis game and checking the standings saw their team one, just ONE, point behind 8th place and an entry ticket into the promised land.

But from there the pain just intensified. The team went on their first annual "bye week", and everyone could only watch helplessly as teams in the tightly competitive bottom of the eastern conference standings piled up the points, leapfrogging over the vacationing Sabres. And the dire predictions, of how teams coming out of their "bye" don't usually perform well upon their return, became prophetic, as the Sabres lost twice to the

two league's worst teams this past weekend, effectively ending their playoff chances. If nothing else, the lost weekend cemented the seller mindset which General Manager Tim Murray must have embraced as the league went into this week's trade deadline.

Irrespective of the team's occasional runs and head fakes, Murray most likely pulled the trigger weeks ago on the overall plan to not bolster the team's flagging hopes with rental players or bold moves.

Earlier this month, Murray gave a lengthy interview on WGR sports radio. His comments were illustrative as to where the team stands right now. "We're still somewhere in that rebuild. We're certainly not at the bottom of it, but we're not close to the top." He went on to say, "We're trying to be better and have been in certain areas. But when you get to the bottom, you can't snap your fingers and lean how to win. This is a process and we're sticking with it."

What is less clear is to what extent Murray is feeling the heat from team ownership and executive management following the team's deliberate attempt at failure to secure the rights to draft Connor McDavid. That didn't

happen. Two marquee trades have turned out to be disasters... the multi player trade to Winnipeg has brought us Evander Kane, who may have at last shaken off his off ice troubles. It also gave us Zack Bogosian for Tyler Myers. Anyone want to take that one back?

Talented defenseman and former first round draft pick Mark Pysyk was swapped to Florida for Dimitri Kulikov. Pysyk is thriving as a Panther, with 2 goals and 11 points and a plus 2 rating in all 60 games he has played this year. As for Kulikov? Anyone want to take that one back?

With all the chaos happening at One Bills Drive these past two months, Murray may be able to quietly slide through this season, and then deliver on the team's most urgent needs - upgrades at defense and need for more scoring at the top of that list. Besides, the crowds at KeyBank Center are as full and robust as they have ever been. Tickets are selling, the fan base is on board, the team has, ahem, improved from the dark reaches of two seasons ago.

For those still hanging on to faint hopes that the Sabres can still make this season happen, consider this... 96 to 98 points

has been the threshold for teams to snag that last playoff berth in the Eastern Conference. As of this past weekend, the Sabres had 62 points with 21 games left on the schedule. So that would mean that the team would have to get 35 points, or 17 wins in their remaining games to get to postseason play. On the March calendar is a home and home series against the powerful Columbus Blue Jackets, another west coast swing mid month when the NCAA basketball tournament comes to town, and two home games with the Toronto Maple Leafs, a team the Sabres have owned forever. Until this year.




